# Arts and STEM Exploration 4th/5th Grade Ms. Jill

This week in Arts we will continue to look at the art principle of balance, focused on symmetry. It's fun to see how the arts relate to math! During our music focus, we will travel to China to meet a new musician and hear instruments and music native to that culture. Finally we will continue brainstorming how time and place is used as an element in drama through some fun improvisation activities. ### Middle School Arts Ms. Jill

Coming up in our visual art studies this week, we will learn about the artist Salvador Dali and compare his art to the Pop artists we've studied the past couple of weeks. We will also work on creating value using pressure as a technique with crayons. During our music time, we will listen to the Nationalistic style of Aaron Copland's music and then continue to review rhythmic patterns as we read simple music. Finally, as we turn to our devised theater time, we will work on activities that teach how to 'share power' and 'take risks' as a group.

Please have your students think about what types of arts 'personal choice projects' they might be interested in pursuing (a few examples: creating a monologue or scene, completing an art project, costume design, practicing an instrument solo or composing a song, creating a dance) for a portion of our day. ## Ms. Stacy's Class (K-1)

It has been amazing getting to know your children the past few weeks and watching them become familiar with their classmates and the classroom procedures with such ease, has been wonderful. This week we will begin our units of study in Science and Social Studies. In Science, we will be learning about the Rainforest habitat. We will learn about where the Rainforests are on the globe and what makes the tropical rainforest habitat unique. In Social Studies, we will begin our unit by reading "The Legend of the BlueBonnet" which is about a time when the Comanche people were experiencing a terrible drought. Students will discuss what a legend is and will get a chance to finger paint bluebonnet flowers to honor the great heart and generosity of this legend. So we will be using paint for this lesson so please do not send your child in their Sunday best as they may wear some home. It is washable but I wanted to give you a heads up.

#### Literacy Foundations Ms. Kassi

Wow, we are having a blast in literacy foundations! Last week I was able to meet with every small group and individual and work on individual skills. This week we will add partner reading, our last center to add to our literacy rotations.

Week 2: Literacy Activities:

- Phonograms: A-Z
- Read Aloud/Grammar: Officer Buckle and Gloria: nouns and Proper nouns
- Phonics Focus: learning how to count sounds, word map, short vowels: u, and e
- High Frequency words: Second sound of /s-z/: as, has, is, his
- Poem of the Week: "Let's Be Friends" (visualization and main message of poem)
- Writer's Workshop: Writing a complete sentence with four parts: capital letter, subject, predicate, and ending punctuation-periods.

#### Ms. Kassi's 2/3 Class

#### STAR360 Assessment

#### STAR 360–It's Here! Now through August 29, 2024

If you would like your student to take the STAR 360 assessment, the opportunity is here! Now in its fifth year of implementation, STAR 360 is back and ready for FHP students! We have partnered with STAR 360 to offer this testing option on a voluntary (no requirement) basis. This option is available to all enrolled FHP students, is free of charge, and gives nearly instant results that will be sent to you via email. The goal of including this as an option to parents is to allow for another layer in our partnership with you.

#### *Some benefits of STAR 360 include:*

\*It can be taken multiple times throughout the school year. This can give you vital information about your student's strengths and areas of growth in real-time. This empowers you to adjust your homeschooling instruction to set goals that can be measured regularly.

\*STAR is a nationally normed test that you can use as (or in addition to) the state requirements for odd year (grades 3-11) testing.

\*STAR assesses in both reading and math and is aligned to Colorado State Standards.

\*Most assessments take 20-30 minutes per section as it utilizes a computer-adaptive design, meaning that questions quickly become individualized, allowing for efficiency and accuracy.

\*STAR allows your child to experience a standardized test in a very non threatening way.

\*As always, student information is kept private.

#### If you're ready to get started, here is what you can expect:

1) The STAR test takes about 20-35 minutes per section. There are two sections--Reading and Math, so the total for the test will take about 60 minutes.

2) The test is on the computer and timed. As far as I know, there is not a clock in the top right corner that counts down, but please instruct your student to still answer each question even if the time expires.

3) Please be sure to send me (Mr. Paul: paul.austin@d49.org ) an email so that I may share the results with you when your student is finished. The results will include an overall score in both reading and math that can be used as a composite. You will also see your student's National Percentile Rank (NPR). These are the two requirements for standardized testing for compliance with the state of Colorado, so it fulfills your testing requirement at the odd grade levels when homeschooling.

4) If you are having your student complete the test at home, please make testing conditions as quiet as possible. If your student is easily distracted or requires a very quiet space when testing, please use ear plugs to block the noise. Do your best to ensure that the environment is suitable for your student's best results. The test can be paused as well if a sudden distraction arises. Also, please be sure to provide an appropriate assessment proctoring experience (don't help your student, don't give answers or hints, don't read for them, etc).

## Field trip Volunteers/Chaperones

Fall Classroom Field Trips are Quickly Approaching - Have you completed a background check yet?

Field trips for our program depend on parent drivers and chaperones. If you would like to help out our program and volunteer, you will need to have a background check completed by District 49. (If you are not sure if your background check is still valid, please check with Ms. Nancy)

- If a background check is completed between July 1 and Feb 28, the background check is valid through June 30th of that year
- If a background check is completed between March 1 and June 30, the background check is valid until June 30th *of the following year*.

\*\*Please note that if you would like to go on the field trip with your student, but are NOT chaperoning or driving other students, you do NOT need to have a background check completed.

#### Field Trip Policy regarding Survey, Permission slip and fees

One of the exciting things we do here at FHP is our classroom field trips. Each class will have two field trips throughout the year, one each semester. (Our Literacy Foundations class will not be having field trips.) These field trips usually take us to exciting locations but sometimes the field trip comes to us right here at FHP. Our teachers put a lot of time and effort into finding wonderful field trips that go with their curriculum and that they feel their students will love and benefit from. We want all of our students to experience these field trips. Here is our timeline and policy for items being turned in so that students can attend their field trip.

Three to four weeks before your student's field trip you will receive a Google Survey via email. This survey will contain all of the details regarding the field trip. Your response allows us to know if your child will be attending the field trip and if your child needs a ride. (Please see Chaperoning information below) The survey will also have a permission slip attached.

**Deadlines**: The survey will let you know when the survey is due by and when the permission slip and any fees are due. All items will be due no later than one week before the field trip. If these items are not turned in one week prior, your child will **not** be able to attend the field trip. We will have a list on the board in the multipurpose room of all the upcoming field trip dates (not all have been scheduled yet) what is needed and the date it is all due by. Your child's teacher will also have due dates and permission slips outside their classrooms.

Please be sure to stay on top of these dates for all of your kids as we want all of our students to be able to attend their field trip.

## Safety Drill, August 29th

We have a building wide safety drill next week, August 29th. In our continued efforts to best serve your students, we will be conducting a safety drill next week Thursday August 29th. Safety drills last approximately 10 minutes, and during that time, an announcement will be made over the PA system directing staff and students to remain inside their classrooms for the Lockdown Drill which includes the terminology, "Locks, Lights, Out of Sight." During the time, FHP staff will be with students and our staff will communicate silently with our cellphones and laptops to be sure that all students were safe and accounted for.

All students will be in classrooms with their FHP staff who will remind students that it is just a drill and that there is no cause for concern. At the conclusion of the drill, it will be announced calmly and quietly that the drill is over and classes will resume with what they had been doing prior to the drill.

When we have a lockdown or lockout drill, we can not allow anyone entrance into the building. I know this may be inconvenient, but it's very important that we put everyone's safety first, and that means practicing these drills in a way that is consistent with how they are to be run.

I know that I am not alone in my dislike for the need for these drills, but I do also see the need for the safety drill. It is of the utmost importance that your children are safe when in our care. We conduct these drills so that we can ensure safety while students are in our care, and the FHP staff appreciates your understanding and trust. I would suggest giving your child a heads-up prior to their enrichment day with us to go over the details of the drill that I have mentioned above so that they know what the drill is and what they can expect, especially if your child can get a little nervous or anxious about drills.

## Homeschool Helpful Tips: Academic Stamina

As we returned to the classroom with your students after a long summer, our staff has recently been discussing academic stamina. Academic stamina refers to the duration your student can work on school work/academic activities before needing a break or getting distracted.

If you took a summer break from a full day of homeschool, you may be noticing your student is struggling with their stamina as well.

Academic stamina is important to build in our students throughout the years so that eventually they will be able to stick to brain power tasks in the workforce and other adult endeavors without getting

distracted. We know our students can stick to highly stimulating activities such as playing with friends and video games so we need to be very thoughtful about increasing the stamina for activities that take longer to produce rewards, such as academics.

Here are a few helpful ways to increase academic stamina in your homeschool:

- Remember the younger the child, the less stamina they may have
- Follow a schedule with routines that are predictable; these help students know what to expect
- Use timers to encourage an increase in stamina and help students set tangible goals
- Build in brain breaks to your schedule and consider timing those as well
- Never underestimate the power of reward for hard work
